Answer

This sign warns people not to blow their horns. The symbol is usually displayed in a quiet area such as a residential area⁺ or school zone. As traffic becomes heavy, impatient drivers tend to make noise with their horns. So people in the quiet areas want to prevent the horns from being blown. They say no one would need to blow a horn if everyone drove carefully and defensively.⁺

⁺residential area : neighborhood devoted to dwellings rather than for commercial or industrial area

⁺drive defensively : drive in a manner that anticipates what other drivers may do, rather than aggressively

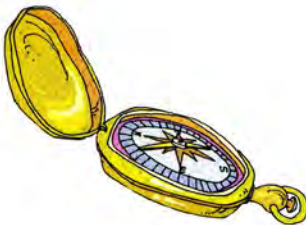

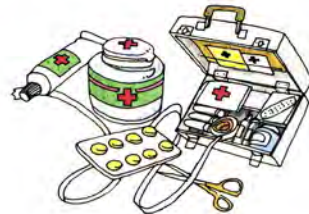
